




With all her wonders, And her tales of old; With all her greatness Her brave deeds and bold. Tall castles of old kings

REMEMBER TRIER

Our nearest outlying city is Trier, the oldest city in Germany, founded by the Romans in 15 B.C. The name at that time was Augusta Treverorum which means the city of the Emperor Augustus.

In the third century it became capital of the western Imperium Romanum. From here Constantine the Great ruled his western empire. Under Constantine's reign Trier became a center of Christianity.

In the fifth century the Roman authorities left Trier under the pressure of the Germanic migration. The Franken tribe conquered the city and western Europe.

When the grandsons of Charlemagne divided the realm in 870 A.D., Trier fell under the reign of the East Franconian realm or the Germany of today.

Out of the Roman ruins Trier grew again into a prosperous period, especially under the fruitful reign of the Archbishop Balduin from Luxembourg (1307-1354). During this period the citizens of Trier hoped to become a free state within the realm, but their star began to sink.

In the fourth century Trier was one of the four metropolitan cities of the Roman Empire. In the late medieval era Trier was an important ecclesiastical and secular capital. Two hundred years later Trier numbered only 3,000 inhabitants.


When Napoleon gained control over large parts of Europe in the early 1800's he eliminated in general the secular powers; therefore the secular power of the bishop of Trier was ended. Thus the charm of the city of today lies in its history of the past.

The nineteenth and twentieth centuries led Trier, in spite of her many misfortunes, especially during the second World War, out of its narrowness as a little rural town to a wider scope for traffic and industry. Because of its great historical heritage, it sees many thousands of visitors every year. The Trier of today has 80,000 inhabitants, is the seat of a bishop, is the main city of the county of Trier, and has main offices of Bundesbahn (Federal Railroads) and Bundespost (Federal Post Offices). Since Trier is the main center

of the wine growing district along the Mosel, Saar, and Ruwer Rivers, it has numerous administrative offices for wine producing estates. From the wine cellars, famous Mosel Wine is sent to many parts of the world.

Along with the modern attractions of Trier the monuments signifying past glories still remain. The Porta Negra, the Roman baths, the Basilika (a former Roman market hall), the Amphitheater, and the Roman Bridge are reminders of the Roman period.

This city is only one example of the many rich cultural and colorful historic advantages that surround us here in Bitburg.



WE MEET OUR NEIGHBORS

One of the aims of the students and teachers of Bitburg High is to better the relationship between Americans and our foreign neighbors with whom we are living.
